NEW MOVES

A Theological Odyssey

J. Denny Weaver, *DreamSeeker Memoir Series 3i*

Raylene Hinz-Penner, *DreamSeeker Memoir Series 2*

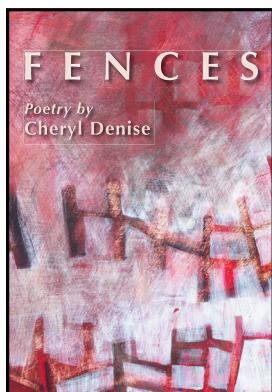

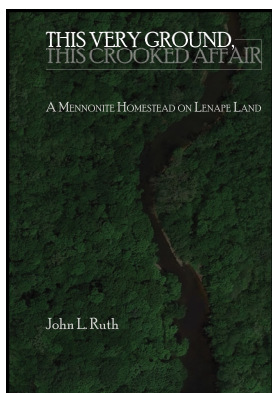

A Mennonite Homestead on Lenape Land

Jane Rohrer, *DreamSeeker Poetry Series 17*

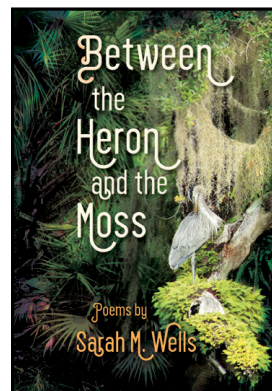
Ruth’s volume connects the centuries-old history of the author’s Pennsylvania Mennonite homestead with that of the land’s indigenous Lenape inhabitants, interweaving documented Pennsylvania history with the national pursuit of a Doctrine of Discovery—and the story of Mennonites who had themselves fled suffering and landlessness with the fates of Native Americans continent-wide.

Reviewing in *Anabaptist World*, Rachel Waltner Goosen sees Ruth’s history as “confessional literature with a driven, critical aim: that those of us benefiting from colonial legacies come to understand the usurping of Indigenous lands as our story. And further, that erasures and omissions of the past do not stand.”

Author, historian, and documentarian **John L. Ruth**, Harleysville, Pennsylvania, is recognized for depicting in many books and film the lives of Mennonites and their spiritual cousins, the Hutterites and the Amish.

Sarah M. Wells, *DreamSeeker Poetry Series 18*

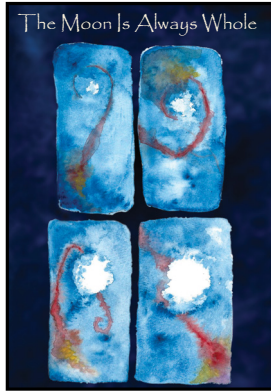

THE MOON IS ALWAYS WHOLE

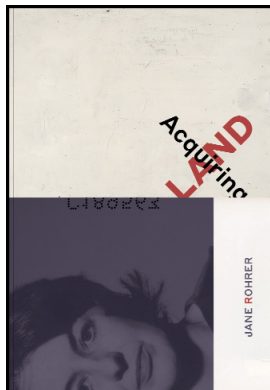
Julia Baker Swann, *DreamSeeker Poetry Series 19*

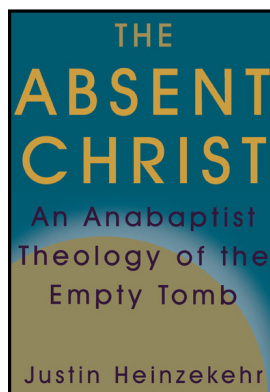

THE ABSENT CHRIST

An Anabaptist Theology of the Empty Tomb

Justin Heinzekehr explores the significance of the empty tomb and Jesus’ physical absence for Anabaptist ecclesiology. The result is an Anabaptist theology that retains key insights such as nonviolence and discipleship, interpreted with the benefit of contemporary understandings of class, gender, and racial power.

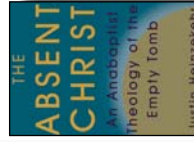
